THE NEW LITURGICAL MOVEMENT – RETRIEVING VATICAN II

A "new liturgical movement" inspired by Pope Benedict XVI is raising some uncomfortable questions. Was *Sacrosanctum Concilium* implemented as the Council Fathers intended? Do we need to go back to the Council document and start again? What would a "reform of the reform" involve? What happens in parishes - does that ignore or deviate from the conciliar source?

The presenter will argue that what has transpired in the Roman Rite over the past fifty years is a case of "loss and gain". A courageous retrieval of the Vatican II source is needed. Much done in the name of the document is open to challenge including: Mass facing the people, the way we receive Communion, the loss of mystery, vulgar music, secularized worship and a failure to cultivate the *ars celebrandi* at all levels.

Most Rev. Peter J. Elliott, Auxiliary Bishop in Melbourne, holds degrees in history (Melbourne), in theology (Oxford), with a Doctorate in sacramental theology from the Lateran University, John Paul II Institute for Marriage and Family. From 1987 to 1997 he served as an official of the Pontifical Council for the Family. He returned to Melbourne as Episcopal Vicar for Religious Education, and later became Director of the John Paul II Institute for Marriage and Family, Melbourne. He was ordained Titular Bishop of Manaccenser in 2007.

He is a Member of the Australian Bishops Commission for the Liturgy. He has served as a Consulter to the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments and is a Member of the Vatican commission "Anglicanae Traditiones" preparing liturgical texts for the Personal Ordinariates for former Anglicans. He is the author of Ceremonies of the Modern Roman Rite, Ignatius Press 1995 etc. (Guia pratica de liturgia, Ediciones Universidad de Navarra 1996) and Ceremonies of the Liturgical Year, Ignatius Press 2002.
